ABSTRACT

Abstracts of all presentations (both oral and poster) should be submitted to Kurt Gottschalk at the above address by February 1, 2003, turned in at the Research Forum on 3.5" diskette in WordPerfect or Microsoft Word, in DOS or Macintosh formats, or sent electronically to the following e-mail address: kgottschalk@fs.fed.us. Contact Kurt Gottschalk at 304-285-1598 if you cannot submit your abstract in one of these formats. We can accept and translate several other word processing formats (i.e., WordStar, MacWrite, etc.). Please send a hard copy of all text. Authors are responsible for the content of their abstract; however, we will do minimal editing if needed. We recommend use of Times Roman 12-pt font for all text (select Postscript proportional spacing).

Format

Single-space all text; double-space between paragraphs, main title to be double-spaced. There is a page limit of one page maximum on all abstracts. (Drafts that do not use proportional spaced font can be up to 25 or 30 percent longer than one page. When we translate to proportional spaced, they should fit on one page.) If we have problems getting the abstract to fit, we will contact you for editorial cutting. Common names of species are acceptable, but give the Latin name and authority in parentheses following the first use that is not in the title.

This page is an example of the required format for submitted abstracts. Text should be typed in Times-Roman 12-pt proportional-spaced font on one side of 8½ x 11 inch paper. Title of the paper is centered, in CAPITALS at the top of the page, double-spaced. Author(s) name, institution, address is to follow 3 spaces below title. Begin ABSTRACT (centered) 3 lines below previous text. Begin text 2 lines down from heading. The abstract should provide an evaluation of the paper's scientific significance as concisely and nontechnically as possible.
