




Motor Vehicle Use Map

This map takes precedence over any on the ground signs. Road, trail and area users must comply with this map as well as all federal, state, and local laws and regulations. Compliance with these rules are the responsibility of the user. These designations apply to the National Forest System Lands and National Forest System roads, trails and areas under National Forest System jurisdiction.

Contents of This Map

This map, dated September 2006, shows the National Forest System roads, National Forest System trails, and the areas on National Forest System lands in the Sheyenne National Grassland that are designated for motor vehicle use pursuant to 36 CFR 212.51. The map also contains a list of those designated roads, trails, and areas that enumerates the types of vehicles that are allowed on each route and in each area and any seasonal restrictions that apply on those routes and in those areas.

It is prohibited to possess or operate a motor vehicle on National Forest System lands on the Sheyenne National Grassland other than in accordance with these designations

(36 CFR 261.13). Violations of 36 CFR 261.13 are subject to a fine of up to \$5000 or imprisonment for up to six months or both (18 U.S.C. 3571(e)). This prohibition applies regardless of the presence or absence of signs.

This map does not display non-motorized uses, over-snow uses, or other facilities and attractions on the Sheyenne National Grassland. Obtain a forest visitor map for more complete information at the Sheyenne Ranger District or the Dakota Prairie Grasslands Supervisors Office. From time to time a National Forest/Grassland may issue an order to close a road, trail, or area on a temporary basis to protect the life, health or safety of forest visitors or the natural or cultural resources in these areas. Such a temporary and/or emergency closures are consistent with the Travel Management Rule (36CFR212.52 (b); 36CFR261 subpart B).

Operator Responsibilities
Operating a motor vehicle on National Forest System roads, National Forest System trails, and in areas on National Forest System lands carries a greater responsibility than operating that vehicle in a city or other developed setting. Not only must the motor vehicle operators know and follow all applicable traffic laws, but they need to show concern for the environment as well as other forest/grassland users. The misuse of motor vehicles can lead to the temporary or permanent closure of any designated road, trail or area. It's also dangerous. **PROTECT YOUR PRIVILEGE. STAY ON DESIGNATED ROADS, TRAILS AND IN DESIGNATED AREAS.**

Motor vehicle use, especially off-highway vehicle use, involves inherent risks that may cause property damage, serious injury, and possibly death to participants. Participants voluntarily assume full responsibility for these damages, risks, and dangers. Motor vehicle operators should take care at all times to protect themselves and those under their responsibility. Some of the Sheyenne National Grassland is remote, and medical assistance may not be readily available. Cellular telephones may not work in some areas of the Sheyenne National Grassland. Operators should take adequate food, water, first aid supplies, and other equipment appropriate for the conditions and expected weather. **ALWAYS REMEMBER TO RESPECT PRIVATE LAND!**

Dispersed camping is allowed on the Sheyenne National Grassland. Limitations occur on taking vehicles off road to access dispersed campsites on Forest Service System lands. Roads that allow vehicles to access dispersed campsites are displayed in the legend and on the map (indicated by dots on either side of the road). This only applies to National Forest Service System lands. Vehicles are allowed to drive off a road up to 300 feet for this purpose. A campsite must first be selected without the use of a vehicle. Once a campsite is determined on Forest Service System lands, drive the most direct route without doing any resource damage or exceeding 300 feet from an approved road. Camping in one location is limited to 14 days.
