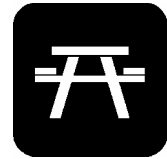


Recreation Opportunity Guide



TROCADERO OVERLOOK PICNIC AREA

DESCRIPTION: This site offers travelers a convenient place to pull over and picnic while soaking in the views of the Trocadero Bay area. It is located just off State Highway 913 (Hydaburg Road) and offers visitors two uncovered picnic pads with tables and grills. Toilets, drinking water, and garbage cans are not available at this site. Please be respectful of others and pack out all garbage.



LOCATION: Take State Highway 924 (Hollis-Klawock Road) to State Highway 913 (Hydaburg Road). Follow this road to milepost 11 and look for picnic area signs.

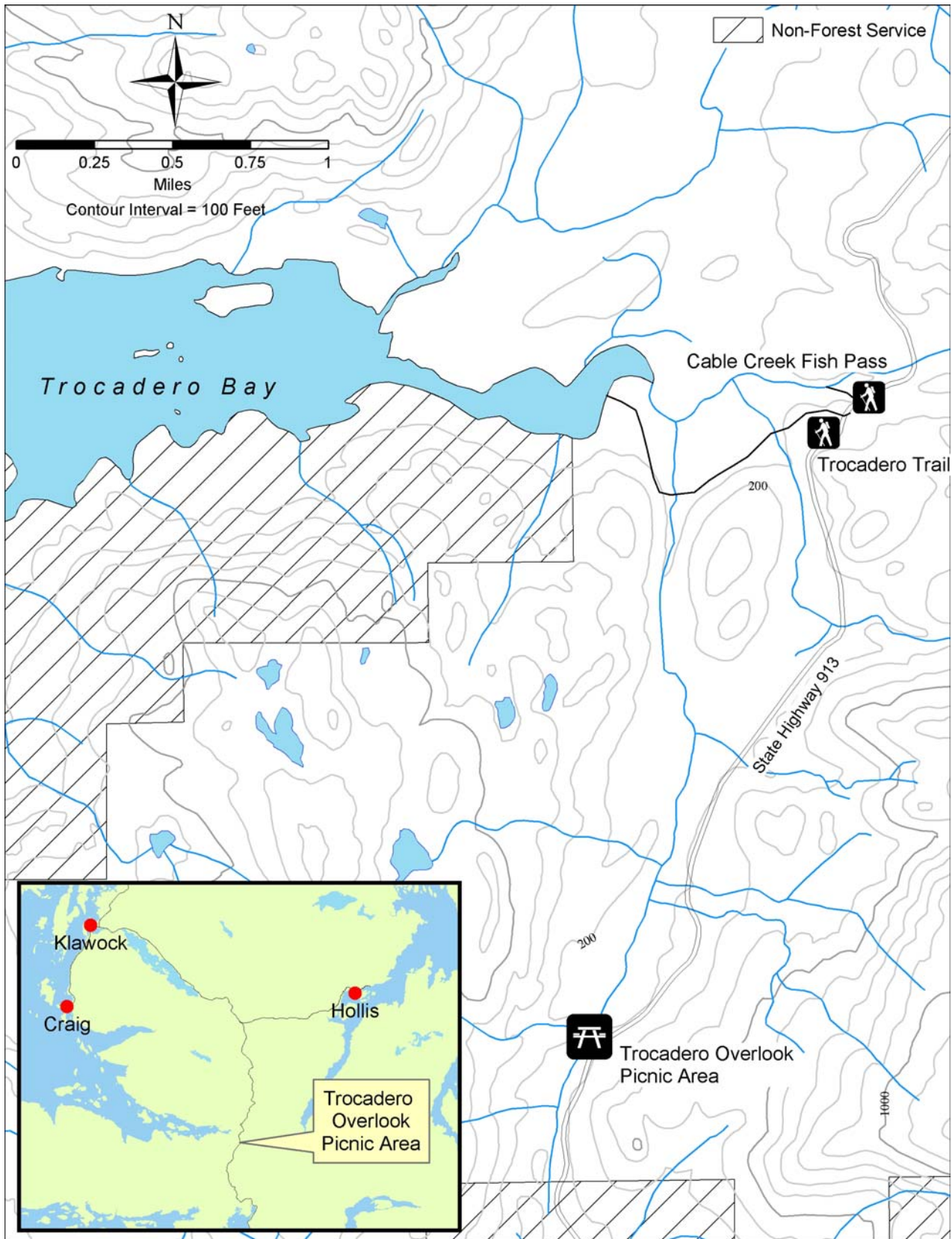
HISTORICAL POINTS: Trocadero Bay (translated into “Trading Bay”) was named after a port in the bay of Cadiz, Spain by the Mourelle’s expedition in the late 1700s. The expedition did not travel the full 11-mile length of the bay, but during their exploration made note of the surrounding flat terrain and dense coniferous forest.

SPECIAL FEATURES: After enjoying the views from your picnic table, take a hike to the Trocadero Bay estuary. Trocadero trailhead is located approximately 2 miles north and offers an enjoyable hike (30-45 minutes one way) along an old roadbed, then changing to crushed rock and boardwalk. At Snipe Creek, an unmaintained path takes you to the estuary. If you’re looking for a shorter hike to settle your lunch (10 minutes), take the Cable Creek Fish Pass Trail (2.5 miles north) and learn about the salmon life cycle. Approximately one mile south on State Highway 913 (Hydaburg Road) is the Soda Lake Trail, which offers a longer hike (2.5 miles one way) passing through different forest types to a small lake.

SAFETY TIPS:

- ✓ *Discharging firearms is prohibited within 150 yards of buildings, campsites, developed recreation sites, or occupied areas*
- ✓ *Fireworks or other explosives are prohibited*
- ✓ *Use only fire rings provided by the Forest Service*
- ✓ *Be respectful of others and keep your pets under control*
- ✓ *Do NOT feed or approach bears!*
- ✓ *Water for consumption should be treated or boiled*
- ✓ *Rubber boots, rain gear and insect repellent are recommended*
