SHOOTING RESTRICTIONS

It is unlawful to discharge a firearm, air rifle, or gas gun in the "Areas Closed to Recreational Shooting" as shown on the map.



EXEMPT from these closure areas are:

- 1) Any person possessing a current and valid Colorado state hunting license and who is actively involved in hunting during an open season.
- 2) Any person discharging a gas-operated paintball gun.



Frequently Asked Questions

Q. Can I shoot in the National Forest?

- A. Yes and no. Generally, recreational shooting is allowed on most National Forest System lands. However, there are some specific areas closed to target shooting and many rules do apply. The map on the inside of this brochure shows those areas closed to recreational shooting on the Pikes Peak Ranger District only. If you plan to shoot elsewhere on the National Forest, please check with the local Forest Service office in that area for restrictions.

Q. Where can I shoot on the Pikes Peak Ranger District?


- A. The Rampart Range Road Shooting Range (Shooting Range) is a designated shooting range, located on Rampart Range Road just north of the Garden of the Gods city park (see map for exact location). Otherwise, you may find a suitable location on the District (outside of the restricted areas indicated on the map) that provides a good earthen back stop and is away from a road. Never shoot at a tree and always remove your target and spent casings.

Q. What are the rules and regulations regarding shooting on the National Forest?

- A. Discharging a firearm is always prohibited within 150 yards of a residence, building, campsite, occupied area, on or across a road, near or across a body of water, in a cave, or in any manner or place whereby any person or property is exposed to injury or damage. More rules, regulations and guidelines are provided in this brochure. Please read them carefully.

Q. Why is shooting prohibited in the areas shown on the map?

- A. These are highly used and heavily concentrated areas with many nearby roads and trails, and private land developments. Restricting shooting reduces hazards to the public and to others who use, live, or work within these areas. Much of the forest remains open to recreational shooting. Although the Shooting Range falls within a prohibited area on the map, the range itself is open to shooting.



Shooting on National Forest System Lands

If you choose not to use the shooting range, you may find a suitable place that is not located in the restricted areas shown on the map. When you find an appropriate place to shoot, ensure your bullets are going into a good earthen backstop and that the area is completely unoccupied.

Rules to Follow

- Ensure that you are not shooting within the restricted areas shown on the shooting closure map.
- Do not discharge a firearm within 150 yards of a residence, building, campsite, occupied areas or into or within a cave.
- Never shoot from or across a traveled route (this includes any type of road or trail located on the forest).
- It is unlawful to shoot across a body of water, or in any manner or place where individuals or property are exposed to injury or damage.
- Shoot only at your intended target ensuring that your bullets are going into a good earthen backstop. Do not shoot into solid rock.
- Use only paper or biodegradable targets. Collect all your casings and trash before you leave the area. Do not shoot glass or metal.
- It is unsafe to shoot after dark.
- Never shoot from a motor vehicle.
- Always remember alcohol and firearms DO NOT mix!
- Do not shoot trees or any other property (signs, gates, etc.) on the forest. Watch out for and be aware of livestock grazing in the area.

- Be aware and know what is public property versus private property. Never shoot across a canyon or down into a drainage.

- Please respect the land and other users of the forest.

Exceptions to Shooting in the Restricted Areas

If you are lawfully hunting (meaning you are actively hunting an animal during an open season and you have a valid hunting license) then you may discharge a firearm within the restricted areas shown on the map, providing you do so in a safe manner. Follow the Division of Wildlife rules and regulations that apply when hunting. Also exempt from the restricted areas are any persons discharging a gas-operated paintball gun. Please shoot safely and responsibly!

Failure to follow these rules and regulations or shooting in an unsafe manner, may be punishable by a fine of not more than \$5,000 for an individual or \$10,000 for an organization, or imprisonment for not more than 6 months, or both.

About Rampart Range Road Shooting Range

There is a designated shooting range located on National Forest Road 300 (see map) that is approximately 5½ miles from “Balanced Rock” in Garden of the Gods park. The shooting range contains four separate lanes. Each lane has an official firing line marked with steel posts. The lanes distances are 25, 50 and 100 yards. The fourth lane is a shotgun only firing lane. Except for the shotgun only lane, the shooting range has tables and benches installed at each of the firing lanes. This area is not staffed or maintained on a daily basis so you must coordinate with other shooters who are using the range as well.

Shooting Range Rules

- The shooting range is open sunrise to sunset.
- No alcoholic beverages allowed.
- Please pick up and properly dispose of your casings, targets, and any other litter. Trash receptacles are not provided so if you pack it in you need to pack it out.
- Use only paper, cardboard, or biodegradable clay targets. Do not shoot at glass or metal objects.
- Discharging rifles or handguns at the shotgun only lane is prohibited.
- Shoot only from the appropriate firing line, shoot downrange, and into the earthen backstop. Do not shoot nearby trees.
- Do not use TV sets, computers, appliances, furniture, glass, metal, or any other miscellaneous objects as targets.
- Before shooting, ensure the area is safe and clear of all other users. Use good sound judgement and common sense.
