Along the Road

U.S. Highway 26/287 crosses the Continental Divide and heads west to Grand Teton National Park and Yellowstone National Park. As you travel through, imagine being a Native American or early explorer navigating through this pristine, rugged wilderness. In some parts of this beautiful area not much has really changed.

Safety in Bear Country

Hike in groups and make noise. Bears don't like surprises. Carry bear spray and know how to use it.

Secure food, trash, and other attractants in a bear-resistant container, hang 10 feet high, or store in a hard-sided vehicle. All attractants must be stored at night or when unattended during the day. Ask about special regulations for harvested big game.

Human-food conditioned bears are bold and often must be destroyed.
