## Rivers, Ranges, and Routes

Here at the confluence of the Hoback and Snake Rivers, you can imagine the ancient glacial flows that cut deep canyons through the gneiss and schist. The towering cliffs of the mountain ranges are the left behind echo of seas long receded.

These rivers and ranges have determined the routes used by both wildlife and people. Historically, pronghorn used what is now Highway 191 as a migration route. Their journey to the Green River Basin and the Red Desert is the longest mammalian migration IN THE WORLD, IN WYOMING!

Today, millions of people travel this same route on their own quest, through a corridor of the ages.

## Safety in Bear Country

Hike in groups and make noise. Bears don't like surprises. Carry bear spray and know how to use it.

Secure food, trash, and other attractants in a bear-resistant container, hang 10 feet high, or store in a hard-sided vehicle. All attractants must be stored at night or when unattended during the day. Ask about special regulations for harvested big game.

**Human-food conditioned bears are bold and often must be destroyed.**
