

Welcome to WYOMING CENTENNIAL BYWAY

PINEDALE

With expansive views of snow-capped peaks, sparkling lakes, abundant wildlife, sheer cliffs, and miles of hiking trails, the Wyoming Centennial Scenic Byway is a jewel in the crown of the west. You'll be traveling through public lands which make up a large part of the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem. The

lower sage covered plains and valleys provide crucial winter homes for many species while the rugged mountains offer summer solitude and recreation.

Explore!

Follow animal trails into the mountains just as the Native Americans, mountain men, and early explorers did. See how the lay of the land has shaped our travel patterns. Travel the trails by foot, horseback, skis, or snowmobile.

Wild Things

We've got wildlife! Watch for moose along the river bottoms, pronghorn, sage grouse, and deer in the sage along the roads, and bald eagles aloft throughout the Byway. Be alert for animals crossing the highway, and cautious when stopping to view them. The Wind River, Wyoming, and Gros Ventre mountain ranges are popular hunting and fishing spots - ask for details locally.

Stay A Spell

The mountain men thought this was a good place to camp and we think you will too. Walk from your tent to cast a line in the famous Green River or hide out in the trees by a mountain lake. Campgrounds, cabins, motels, and lodges are available.





Breaking Trail

Evidence of hunting for buffalo, pronghorn, and other animals has been found dating back over 6,000 years.

Shoshone, Bannock, and Ute tribes traveled through here creating many of the trails our roads follow today.

Early explorers, fur trappers, and westward migration along the Oregon Trail used these routes. Eventually hardy settlers and ranchers made the high plains along the mountain edges their home. They welcomed early travelers to dude ranches and hunting camps.

Today's explorers are searching out natural gas deposits; their trails have built a new economy for this rugged land.
