## **ORO GRANDE ROAD - FDR 65**

**Difficulty:** EASY

**Trail Use:** Heavy

**Length:** 4.42 miles one-way from Access #1 to Access #2

**Elevation:** Start at 9,300 feet and ends at 9,222 feet (highest point 9,387 feet)

**Elevation Gain:** +403 feet - 481 feet = -78 feet

**Open To:** MTN. BIKING, HIKING, ATV

### **Access #1:**

- From I-70 take Exit 205, Silverthorne / Dillon, and travel south on HWY 6 toward Dillon and Keystone.
- Approximately 1.16 miles south of I-70 turn left at the traffic light at the intersection of HWY 6 and Evergreen Road (Lord of the Mountain Church is on your left).
- After turning left, immediately turn right onto Straight Creek Road (County Road 51) and follow this road for approximately .59 miles to just past the Forest Service compound and Dillon Water Tank.
- Right after the road turns to gravel, there is a pull out parking area to your right, park here.
- In front of the parking area (south) is an access road which is the beginning of the Oro Grande Road. The beginning and end of this road are maintained by the US Forest Service, while the rest of the road is part of Summit County Open Space.

### **Access #2:**

- From I-70 take Exit 205, Silverthorne / Dillon, and travel south on HWY 6 toward Dillon and Keystone.
- Approximately 5.4 miles south of I-70 turn left at the Summit County Landfill on Frey Gulch Road (FDR 66) and park along the road.

### **Trail Highlights:**

- An abundance of wildflowers can be seen from mid-late June.
- Approximately 2.07 miles from the beginning of the ride you will come to a 4-way intersection. To complete a short loop, turn right (west) on the dirt road and go past the cemetery to HWY 6. Cross HWY 6 and continue north back to Dillon on the paved bike path.
- To complete the longer route continue straight (south) for approximately 1.16 miles to the next intersection and bear right to continue toward the Summit County Landfill near HWY 6.
- Cross HWY 6 and continue north back to Dillon on the paved bike path.

### **Important Information:**

- **STAY ON DESIGNATED ROADS AND TRAILS TO PREVENT RESOURCE DAMAGE.**
