WEBSTER PASS ROAD - FDR 285

Difficulty: MORE DIFFICULT

Trail Use: Moderate

Length: 3.72 miles one-way to Webster Pass summit

Elevation: Starts at 10,578 feet and ends at 12,085 feet (highest point 12,085 feet)

Elevation Gain: +1,507 feet - 0 feet = +1,507 feet

Open To: MTN. BIKING, HIKING, OHV

Access:

- From I-70 take Exit 205, Silverthorne / Dillon, and travel east on HWY 6 toward Keystone.
- Just past Keystone, turn right onto Montezuma Road (County Road 5).
- Follow Montezuma Road for 7 miles to the town of Montezuma. Travel through Montezuma to Webster Pass Road. There are several wide spots at the intersection of Webster Pass and Montezuma Roads which will accommodate trailers. Be aware of possible vehicle traffic on this road near the trailhead.
- If these spots are occupied there is additional parking at the Deer Creek trailhead which is .5 miles further on at the end of the road.

Trail Highlights:

- Less than a mile from the trailhead you will get great views of the north side of Teller Mountain, elevation 12,602 feet, to the south.
- Further along on the road to the left you will see Santa Fe Peak, Sullivan Mountain, Geneva Peak and Landslide Peak, all of which are over 13,000 feet in elevation.
- Approximately 2.4 miles from the trailhead, you will come to a road intersection. Bear to the left to continue toward the summit of Webster Pass, 1.36 miles further on. Bear to the right to go to Deer Creek Road (FDR 5).
- A loop can be made by going over Radical Hill to Deer Creek Road (FDR 5) and then following Deer Creek Road north back toward Montezuma. You can also go south on Deer Creek Road to the Swan Valley Summer Recreation Area and on toward Breckenridge.

- **THIS ROAD IS USED FOR MULTIPLE ACTIVITIES TO INCLUDE MTN. BIKING, HIKING AND OHV USE. PLEASE RESPECT OTHER USERS.**
- A large portion of this route travels above timberline. For this reason, be sure to check the weather forecast and choose a clear day for your trip to avoid afternoon thunderstorms.
