MINERS CREEK ROAD - FDR 1000

Difficulty: EASY

Trail Use: Moderate

Length: 2.53 miles (one-way)

Elevation: Starts at 9,134 feet and ends at 9,918 feet (highest point 9,988 feet)

Elevation Gain: +859 feet – 75 feet = +784 feet

Open To: OHV, HIKING, MTN. BIKING

Access:

- From I-70 take Exit 203, Frisco / Breckenridge, and travel south on HWY 9 towards Breckenridge.
- From the Frisco Main Street and Summit Boulevard (HWY 9) traffic light continue for .5 miles to the next traffic light at the County Commons entrance (CR 1004).
- Turn right at the traffic light and follow this road for approximately 200 yards and turn right, then an immediate left turn and continue up the gravel road to the paved bike path.
- **USE EXTREME CAUTION** entering the road/bike path up the hill where it will intersect with the paved Frisco/Breckenridge bike path. Cross the paved bike path and continue up the gravel road.

Trail Highlights:

- The first item of interest that can be seen is Rainbow Lake, which is on the right-hand side.
- The main Miners Creek Road is bisected by side roads which provide access to several old mining sites. These roads may narrow quickly and large OHVs may find these side roads impassable.
- At the end of Miners Creek Road travelers are rewarded with a majestic view of the northern portion of the Tenmile Range.
- The Miners Creek and Peaks hiking trails can be accessed via the Miners Creek Road.

Important Information:

- **STAY ON DESIGNATED ROADS TO PREVENT RESOURCE DAMAGE.**
- **THIS ROAD IS USED FOR MULTIPLE ACTIVITIES TO INCLUDE OHV USE, HIKING AND MTN. BIKING. PLEASE RESPECT OTHER USERS.**
- Camping and fires are prohibited around Rainbow Lake and anywhere below the first non-bridge stream crossing.
