<p>Current Status</p>	<p>Today, fire behavior was moderate, but active in the southeast corner. Burnout was completed and containment further secured on the southeast part of the fire.</p> <p>On the west side, fire “fell” down from the high cliffs onto plateaus in an unnamed canyon. Firefighters are monitoring the progress of those small areas and will determine tomorrow what action is needed based on available access.</p> <p>Today’s high winds associated with the passing thunderstorms did not affect fire status. The northern containment line in the Sterling Canyon area was tested by 30-40 mph winds and firelines held.</p> <p>Rehabilitation began today on Highway 89A from Slide Rock State Park south. Arizona State fire resources were chipping the unburned material that crews have removed from around the structures prior to the fire’s arrival. As part of the rehabilitation efforts, these chips are being broadcast along Highway 89A.</p> <p>Highway 89A from Flagstaff south to Halfway Picnic area is open to residents and business owners only. Oak Creek Canyon and Highway 89A south of the Halfway Picnic Area to Uptown Sedona remain closed to all but fire traffic for safety reasons. Law enforcement personnel are stationed at the picnic area to enforce the road closure. The closure will be re-evaluated on a daily basis and re-opened when the dangers diminish. If an emergency situation should occur, the warning system would be activated and Coconino County Sheriff’s officers would contact individuals with further instructions.</p> <p>Residents and visitors in Sedona and the Verde Valley areas can expect to see less smoke in the next few days. Emergency measures are in place to notify the public should there be any concerns for residents. The Arizona Department of Environmental Quality continues to monitor air quality on a daily basis. Smoke-related inversions should lift around 9:00 am each day.</p> <p>Threatened and endangered species habitat and wilderness values continue to be a concern during fire suppression efforts.</p> <p>The point of origin for the wildland fire is closed to public access. An \$11,000 reward is now being offered for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons responsible for the wildland fire. The number to call is 928-527-3600.</p>	
<p>Estimated Acreage/expected containment</p>	<p>4,222 acres. Acreage is based on infrared imaging by aircraft. Containment is estimated at 50%; full containment is predicted for June 28. Approximately 4.5 miles of fireline remain to be built.</p>	
<p>Resources on the Fire/Costs</p>	<p>Crews: <u>20</u> Helicopters: <u>8</u> Engines: <u>33</u> Water tenders: <u>15</u> Total Personnel: <u>825</u> Other resources continue to arrive. Costs to Date: \$ 4,500,000.</p>	
<p>Cooperators</p>	<p>City of Sedona, Office of State Forestry, Yavapai County Sheriff’s Office, Coconino County Sheriff’s Office, Department of Public Safety, Arizona Department of Transportation, Sedona Fire District, Sedona Police Department, Sedona Airport Authority, Grand Canyon Chapter of the American Red Cross, Arizona Department of Environmental Quality, Forest Service, Bureau of Indian Affairs, Bureau of Land Management, and National Park Service.</p>	
<p>Evacuations and Public Meetings</p>	<p>The next community meeting at the Elk’s Lodge near the Sedona Airport will be Monday, June 26, at 1:30 p.m. In addition to the update on fire progress, there will be photographs of firefighters in action.</p> <p>The evacuation order for the following communities remains in effect:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ■ Oak Creek Canyon from Midgely Bridge to the Halfway Picnic area (this includes homes, businesses and Forest Service campgrounds). ■ Residents are being escorted in and out of the evacuated area by the Coconino Sheriff’s Office on a limited basis to retrieve any pets and livestock as well essential items such as personal medications. 	

<p>Closures and restrictions</p>	<p>Increasing fire danger conditions across the Southwest has warranted closure of the entire Coconino NF. The forest was closed to public access and use Friday morning, June 23, at 8 a.m. Closures in the past have proven to be an effective means of reducing the number of human-caused fires. Penalties for violation of this closure range from \$100 to \$5,000.</p> <p>Included in the Coconino NF closures:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • All campgrounds, day use picnic areas and cabins on the forest. • All trails on the Coconino National Forest. • All lakes, including Lake Mary, Ashurst Lake, Kinnikinick Lake, Blue Ridge Reservoir, Stoneman Lake. • Cinder Hills Off-Highway Vehicle Area north of Flagstaff. • St. Joseph's Youth Camp near Mormon Lake. • Arizona Snowbowl Skyride. • All National Forest System Roads will be closed, but all interstates, state and county roads through the Coconino National Forest will remain open.
<p>Incident plans for tonight</p>	<p>Tonight firefighters will continue working in Oak Creek Canyon to secure the southeastern containment line. The fire is expected to continue backing slowly. Engine crews will be working on the west side of the fire to improve water handling capabilities.</p> <p>Structural protection measures for residences and other structures within Oak Creek Canyon will also continue.</p>
<p>Fire weather</p>	<p>The forecast for tonight is for widely scattered, dry thunderstorms (20%) through 8:00 pm with decreasing clouds later. Temperatures on the fire will be 48-55 degrees. Humidities are predicted at 32-37%. Winds on Wilson Mountain will be gusty and erratic at 15-25 mph outflow winds in the early evening. Winds becoming northeast 4-8 mph by 9:00 pm. The extended forecast for Tuesday through Thursday calls for a slight chance of dry thunderstorms each day, with high temperatures continuing throughout the week. Low level moisture as the result of thunderstorm outflows will linger.</p>
<p>Fire and Other Information</p>	<p>Although the National Forest is closed, Sedona and Flagstaff still offer many summer attractions and activities. Visit the Sedona Chamber of Commerce website (www.sedonachamber.com) for information regarding the many things to do in and around Sedona. Private campgrounds and the campground at Fort Tuthill County Park near Flagstaff will remain open with campfire and smoking restrictions. All Forest Service offices and visitor centers will be open.
