American Fork Canyon is about 46,000 acres and contains 35 facilities.



2007 Accomplishments

- Maintained 90 miles of motorized, equestrian, hiking, and biking trails.
- Operated and maintained 5 picnic areas, 2 interpretive sites, 2 fishing sites, 1 observation site, 7 dispersed camping sites, 2 winter cross country ski sites and 14 trailheads.
- Provided security, compliance, education, and information patrols conducted by Forest Service personnel.
- Installed new posters and signs for campgrounds, picnic areas, trailheads, and roads.
- Plowed and maintained trailheads, cleaned facilities, and groomed cross country ski and snowmobile trails.
- Maintained and fostered recreation fee partnership with National Park Service (Timpanogos Cave National Monument), Utah County (Sheriffs and Search and Rescue), Utah Department of Transportation, and Utah Division of State Parks and Recreation (Wasatch Mountain State Park).
- Supplemented an extensive volunteer program in American Fork Canyon, updated signing on the Great Western Trail and continued sign replacement on all trails within American Fork Canyon.
- Initiated reconstruction of Little Mill campground and implemented Sawmill picnic area construction.
- Finished the Aspen Grove 0.5 mile trail re-route and bridge replacement project.
- Helped fund recreation personnel including 4 forest protection officers, 2 wilderness rangers, an 8-person trail crew, a 6-person developed area maintenance crew and a 6-person recreation fee crew.
- Completed installation of a foot bridge at Granite Flat Campground.



Recreation Fee Program



Projects Planned for 2008

- Reconstruct the Grey Cliffs and Echo picnic areas.
- Operate and maintain winter recreation program, developed and dispersed recreation sites, trailheads, and patrol
- Work with Utah Department of Transportation to reduce hazard trees and place barrier rock along SR-92 corridor in American Fork Canyon.
- Continue to work closely with our partners: National Park Service, Utah Department of Transportation, Utah County Sheriffs, Wasatch Mountain State Park, local law enforcement, local City and County Governments, the Timpanogos Emergency Response Team, Search and Rescue, and our publics and recreation users.
- Administer approximately 51 special use permits.
- Operate and maintain winter recreation program.
- Repair the water tank to supply Mount Timpanogos campground and install new fire rings.
- Rehabilitate Aspen Grove and Timpooneke trailheads. This includes consolidating a number of social trails to access the main trail into the Mt. Timpanogos Wilderness area, placement of a bulletin board, and re-vegetating the existing social trails.
- Finish reconstruction of Little Mill campground and Sawmill picnic area.
- Continue updating the trail signs, trailhead kiosks, recreation fee information, and campground and picnic area signs and bulletin boards.
