

Removal Conditions

- Mushroom must be cut off at the ground level (NOT PULLED), raking or other ground disturbing devices/animals are prohibited.
- Divots (displaced ground material) generated with mushroom collections must be replaced.



Be a No-Trace Camp Leader

- Pickup every piece of litter
- Erase all signs of a fire.
- Replace rocks and logs where they were.
- Pack-out litter and non-burnable, mine and others.

2006 Mushroom Guide



Free Use:

A permit is not required to harvest, possess or transport less than three gallons (per day). Free use mushrooms can not be sold, bartered or given away.

Commercial Use:

A commercial mushroom permit is required if you harvest, possess, or transport more than three gallons per day of any species of mushrooms, or intend to sell harvested mushrooms.

Camping:

A camping permit is required if you camp while commercially picking mushrooms. Ranger Districts will issue camping permits.

Commercial Mushroom Permits can be purchased at the following rates:

1. **\$20.00—Daily Permits (Minimum sale for consecutive 4 days).**
2. **\$100.00 -Season Permit January 1 - December 31**

Commercial mushroom picking is not permitted within National Forest Wilderness areas, Late Successional Reserves, and Research Natural Areas.

Frequently Asked

Who needs a permit to pick mushroom?

Anyone who plans to sell or pick more than three gallons per day needs a permit. Individuals under the age of 18 may be added to the permit of a parent/guardian. Each additional person added to the permit will be charged the permit fee. Those commercial harvesters who are under age 18, whose parent or legal guardian will not be harvesting, should be named on the Permit along with the parent or legal guardian. Both signatures are required. The parent/guardian will be identified as "Non-Harvester" on the permit. The cost of the permit will be charged for the individual under age 18 only.

Where can I pick Mushrooms?

Once a permit has been purchased, mushrooms may be harvested anywhere on the Okanogan National Forest unless otherwise restricted by the Okanogan National Forest Travel Plan Map or Special Closure. Open roads vary from area to area. Visitors are asked not to drive on water-saturated, muddy roads. Check with the local Forest Service office for an update on road conditions and special closures.

What happens if I do not follow the terms of the permit?

The Forest Service reserves the right to revoke the permit on non-compliance with permit conditions. In addition, you may be issued a citation, which may require you to appear in court and/or pay a fine if found guilty.
