Michigan Cross Country Cycle Trail (MCCCT)

*It is the policy of the Huron-Manistee National Forests that all Forest lands are **closed unless posted open**. Motorized vehicles that are licensed as ORVs can operate on trails, roads, and areas which are designated and signed for their use. All National Forest roads are open to "street legal" vehicles, unless posted closed. Motorized trails are designed for vehicles less than 50" wide.*

The Michigan Cross Country Cycle Trail (MCCCT) is over 1,200 miles long and located on roads and trails throughout Michigan's lower peninsula. Parts of the trail are found on National Forest, State, County, and other public and private lands. This brochure highlights the trail found on the Baldwin Ranger District. Maps of segments not on National Forest systems lands can be obtained by contacting the Michigan Cycle Conservation Club, P.O. Box 486, Coldwater, MI 49036 - 517-781-4805.

In addition to the MCCCT, a cycle trail connects with the MCCCT to form a loop known as the "Big O". The "Little O" ATV trail also connects with the MCCCT and provides 41 miles of loop riding. The "Little O" ATV trail connects with DNR trails at Hwy M-37 north of Wolf Lake. The MCCCT continues south into the White Cloud Ranger District. (See Brochure #3, MCCCT)

This segment of the MCCCT and "Big O" Loop provides 90 miles for licensed motorcycles.

The trail is located on a combination of single track 40" trail, forest, and county roads. It connects with the segment on the White Cloud Ranger District where there is a 26 Mile loop for unlicensed motorcycles and ATVs. This loop is 50" single track trail.

Considerations

- The trail crosses and utilizes numerous County, State, and Forest Roads, so attention to **STOP, STOP AHEAD**, and **INTERSECTION** signs is important.
- Gas and public phones are located in Baldwin, Walhalla, and Wolf Lake.
- Please pay attention to signs designating licensed and unlicensed motorcycle and ATV segments. ONLY the 41 mile "Little O" loop is open to unlicensed ATVs and motorcycles. You must have a street legal motorcycle to ride the entire "Big O" loop.
- The trail is posted with bright orange **TRIANGLE** confidence markers with symbols designating use. Travel **only** trails designated open for the type of ORV you have.

- All ORVs must have, in good working condition and in constant use, a muffler which will meet or exceed all sound emission standards set by state law. Exhaust noise shall not exceed 99Db(A) or 94Db(A) on vehicles manufactured after Jan 1, 1982 when tested according to the provisions of the SAE J1287, June 86 test. All ORVs must be equipped with a U.S. Forest Service approved spark arrester.

Trailheads

32nd Street: From Baldwin take Hwy M-37 north 2 miles to 32nd Street. Go west on 32nd Street, 2 miles to the trailhead. It is located on the north side of 32nd Street.

Hwy M-37: From Baldwin take Hwy M-37 north 9 miles to the trailhead. It is located on the west side of M-37 just 1 mile north of Wolf Lake.
