Dear Mr. Chairman:

I am pleased to provide you information on the accomplishments of the Quincy Library Group, as requested by Senate Report 111-38 (p. 77) and the Herger-Feinstein Quincy Library Group Forest Recovery Act (the Act) (P.L. 105-277).

Senate Report 111-38 directs the Secretary of Agriculture to submit to Congress a report on the status of the pilot project, including the source and use of funds, the acres treated, a description of the results, a description of the economic benefits to local communities, a comparison of the revenues generated by, and costs incurred in, the implementation of the resource management activities, and activities planned for the following fiscal year.

In fiscal year (FY) 2011, the Department of Agriculture's Forest Service provided \$25.6 million for the treatment of 11,552 acres, which was short of the 25,000 acres originally targeted, due to a variety of factors, including a depressed timber market in California and the effects of appeals and litigation. In addition, 488 acres that were shown as accomplished in previous Status Reports to Congress were actually accomplished in FY 2011, resulting in a total accomplishment of 12,040 acres. In FY 2012, the Forest Service funded the Quincy Library Group at \$26.2 million for 25,000 acres of treatment. Although the Act is scheduled to expire at the end of FY 2012, the President's Budget for FY 2013 includes a request to extend the authority in order to allow an independent panel to compile lessons learned and prepare a final report to Congress as required by the legislation.

Enclosed is a copy of the pilot project status report for FY 2011. A similar letter is being sent to Senator Lisa Murkowski, Congressman Michael K. Simpson, and Congressman James Moran.
